- The Housing Committee shall consist of a maximum of seven (7) members, one member of Council, the Housing Coordinator and 5 appointed members.
- The Chair of the Housing Advisory Committee shall be the Councillor appointed by Council to the housing portfolio.
- The Chair may select an Acting Chair, as required, for a meeting or part thereof for example in the case of a conflict of interest.

Chief and Council will review all applicants and appoint one (1) member.







What beautiful weather we have been having lately! 😂

The daycare staff and families have been very busy the past few months with different activities, trips and training.

As some of you may have seen, the TMFC has a new boat. I had the opportunity to go to a meeting in September 2017 with Independent First Nations. The purpose of the meeting was to assist Independent First Nations with proposals to obtain funding through *The Journey Together/The Truth and Reconciliation Commission*. The main focus of our proposal was making connections with the land and more land based activities. In December 2017 we found out we were successful in obtaining funding. Some of the start up costs for the program which we applied for included funding for a boat, 2 snowmobiles, and sleighs. We were also able to purchase helmets and life jackets for when we go out on the snowmobiles or on the boat. Through the funding we have also been able to purchase an ice hut for next winter's outings. Programming funding includes funds for family trips to local pow wows, parent workshops, cultural activities, and financial assistance for families 0-6 to attend appointments for specialized services. I would like to say milgwetch to Tracy Paul for her assistance with the proposal.

Some of the activities we have done over the winter were: ice fishing, snowmobile trips out on the land, sliding, setting snares, and trips to the sugar bush.

This Spring was very busy. In May the daycare hosted a family Mother's Day dinner for all the daycare families. In May the daycare took the daycare children out to set net and showed the children how to clean fish as well. June was another busy month. On the 9th and 10th of June, the TMFC families had the opportunity to attend the North Bay Indigenous Centre Pow wow in North Bay. It was a beautiful weekend and everyone had a great time. On June 13th the daycare hosted a Father's Day fish fry. Miigwetch to Jamie, Alex, and Jessie for cooking the delicious fish and fries. On June 14th we had a parenting workshop for all parents facilitated by Martin Liberio. On June 15th the daycare staff had a day of training with Martin.

The TMFC has plenty of summer activities planned. Some of the activities that we have planned include: trip to the strawberry patch, beach days, outings/shore lunch with the elders, summer family trip, family camping trip, evening campfire/storytelling, and weekly trips for the preschool children and JK/SK to gymnastics. Event notices will go out the TMFC families closer to the event dates.

The daycare will be closed for the week of July $16-20^{th}$ so the staff may attend the Native Early Childhood Education Conference in Sarnia, ON, hosted by Wapole Island.

FORESTRY FIELD TRIP with LMLC

WAY TO GO ANGEL AND SADIE !!! Grade 7/8 2018 Forestry School Trip

Congratulations, Angel and Sadie!



The two girls from Laura McKenzie Learning Centre had the opportunity to spend a day May 29th learning about some of the timber harvest operations taking place on n'Daki Menan. The two girls had an early start from the island and got to Eacom's Elk Lake sawmill for a short talk from the company's Woodland Manager – Mr. Kyle Aird, who described Eacom's operations and outlined some of the many career opportunities the forest industry has to offer.

From there, the group headed to Willet Township with Mr. Aird, Sam Haystead (Operations Foreman) and Allan Legros (the owner of RTMI, the harvesting contractor). On the way to the jobsite; Sam Haystead gave the girls a brief description of all the different forest stands that we passed by, along with what types of timber were harvested and why they were harvested.

Once we were on the jobsite, the group learned about some of the ways that timber harvesting is carried out and how forest values are pre

served for the future along with how forestry is carried out to protect forest values. They also learned onsite how to age a tree, along with how to tell the seasonal conditions based on its growth rings.

The forwarder that Sadie is standing on takes the logs once they have been cut from the forest to the roadside where they will be loaded on trucks and taken to the mill. Believed to be the highlight of the trip to Angel and Sadie was the chance to drive in the forwarder while it collected the logs from the Forest and placed the logs by the road.

Finally, On the way out we stopped for lunch by one of the lakes just off a previously cut forest-ry block. They learned that since the block was trying to mimic the use of fire they cut to the shore and a certain percentage of the lake.

FACT SHEET on Inventus Mining Proposal for Bulk Sample - Pardo Project



June 13, 2018

WHO Inventus Mining Corp. (the company) has been working with TFN /TAA since 2013 through positive and mutually respectful relations. The company is working toward defining a resource and potentially a positive "Development Decision". The company has also been helpful to the TFN/TAA as we look to define economical resource projects on our proposed reserve lands.

WHAT The Bulk Sample: Inventus is proposing to Bulk Sample at four locations to reach a total weight of 50,000 Tonnes of ore grade broken rock ready to be transported and milled in Matheson, Ontario at the Black Fox Mill. The combined total effected surface area is 6400 m2 (or the equivalent of 1.5 football fields).

WHERE As the crow flies the **Pardo Project** is 25 km southwest of Bear Island or 20 km north of River Valley in Pardo Twp. Access is from Hwy 805 on all seasons logging roads. See the link below for Location, Geology and photos of the rock:

WHEN The company hopes to conclude community consultation and approval of the **Draft Closure Plan** this summer and commence the bulk sample this fall and finish up in 2019.

WHY Some background infoA 1000 tonne Bulk Sample was removed in 2017 and showed a grade of 4.2 grams gold/tonne while drilling indicated only 1 gram/tonne. It seems the only reliable way or method to define the gold grade variability of the host rock to be mined is to bulk sample. A larger bulk sample is now needed to accurately define a certifiable resource. A sample larger than 1000 Tonnes means the company has to move to "Advanced Exploration Stage" and a Closure Plan. THE DRAFT CLOSURE PLAN

The Draft Closure Plan: The closure plan is needed because the proposed Bulk Sample of 50,000 Tonnes can only be done if the project is at the "ADVANCED EXPLORATION STAGE". Work done at this level requires a Closure Plan to ensure rehabilitation to the land affected is planned and financed before the work begins. A Community Information Session on the proposed work and Closure Plan is scheduled for July 4th at the Laura McKenzie Learning Centre. Inventus will be represented by key personnel and take any questions and explain the ins and outs of their proposal. While the information is technical it will be presented in layman's terms. 
ADVANCED EXPLORATION STAGE - At this

The Lands and Resources Department is pleased to announce that we were chosen out of 200 applicants across Canada, and that we are one of 3 FN's in Ontario, to be approved for the Indigenous Community-Based Climate Monitoring Program. Through this program, we will be undertaking community-based climate data research over the next 3 years. We will employ one full time technician, and 2 youth over the period of 3 years.

Below is a snapshot of what Temagami First Nation research will entail.

The Building Bridges Between Climate Data Obtained Through Traditional Anishinabek Monitoring and Current Scientific Climate Monitoring Systems on Lake Temagami program will demonstrate how traditional knowledge and monitoring techniques can be used alongside scientific techniques to monitor how climate change is affecting the traditional Lands of the Teme Augama Anishnabai / Temagami First Nation.

This will be demonstrated via monitoring climate data

through **precipitation**, **temperature**, and **wind logs** on a daily basis, weekly logs of **water temperature** along with **ice thickness** and **depth** (season dependent).

Monthly traditional knowledge mapping sessions will be held to gain traditional knowledge on weather events, ice conditions, walleye spawning areas, and changes in the times of year of moose call and harvest.

WATER MONITORING, to assess how temperature changes are affecting the conditions of the water supply, will take place throughout the year. This will be done through the testing of water clarity and total phosphorous content to determine effects on potable water.



FLOW will be monitored in three creeks stemming from Lake Temagami to assess how creeks and habitat in those creeks are being affected by change in flow (walleye spawning habitat, bank degradation, etc).

ICE CONDITIONS will be monitored throughout the season through scientific metrics alongside the gathering of traditional knowledge.



MAPLE SAP COLLECTION annual periods will be monitored along with quality and quantity of the sap. This will determine how temperature is affecting maple sap production and harvesting.

MEDICINAL PLANT MONITORING through traditional knowledge gathering and documenting growth and harvesting times.



WALLEYE SPAWNING TIMES, spawning habitat, and conditions of eggs will be assessed to determine how the water temperature change is affecting the spawning habitats of one of the main traditional food sources for the First Nations Community.



MOOSE MONITORING for yearly changes in mating times will be assessed through moose call assessments and will determine how climate change and the increase of temperature is affecting the time of year that moose are mating and how it is changing the hunting times for the First Nations people.



REINFORCE THE TRADITIONAL KNOWLEDGE TRANSFER from elders to youth and will demonstrate the effect climate change has on the community and its surrounding natural environment and will provide a baseline that will aid in adaptive actions.

Catherine Debassige, Business Development Officer for Waubetek visited Bear Island on June 8th.

Catherine is a member of the M'Chigeeng First Nation and has a background with the Business Development Bank of Canada, where she supported Indigenous entrepreneurs with financing and consulting options.

She also worked with Gezhtoojig Employment and Training in Sudbury, Ontario, as a Business Counselor, serving the surrounding First Nation communities. She is an Instructor in Business Fundamentals, and Accounting courses as a way to share knowledge and encourage entrepreneurship at the post-secondary level, and has assisted with Community Economic Engagement Planning.

Along with myself, TFN Economic Development Officer John Shymko, she met with community members to discuss Waubetek services and the merits of a business plan with a free personal workshop entitled "Small Business Cash Flow & Funding Options".

As an additional workshop, Catherine and I met with Patsy Turner and a number of students from the Laura McKenzie Learning Centre. We discussed business fundamentals and entrepreneurial concepts and found that a number of students were well on their way in setting up businesses of their own.

Catherine wrote me later and stated that it was "so inspiring to see young people take action! We should think about additional ways to highlight young entrepreneurial spirit to continue to nurture and support their efforts!"

Indigenous Culture Fund Grants

Still Open For Submissions

Please be aware that the Ontario Arts Council offers a grant relating to Indigenous Culture of up to \$5000.00 known as the Indigenous Culture Fund Small Grant.

First-time applicants, youth and elders are all encouraged to apply for these with proposed short-term community, culture and way-of-life projects.

Applications are reviewed with a quick turnaround time. Ontario-based Indigenous organizations, groups and individuals are eligible.

There are five funding categories:

1) Community/Culture/Way of Life: for projects, events or activities

Examples:

Organizing a cultural camp where Elders, language speakers and knowledge keepers take youth out on the land and share their teachings.

Hosting a gathering where traditional medicines and harvesting teachings are shared with community members.

2) Indigenous Language Projects

Examples:

Running Indigenous language immersion classes in the community.

Participating in an Indigenous workshop, program or class as an individual learner.

Cultural Research, Documentation, Tools and Resources

Examples:

Developing a protocols tool-kit that will support archaeological digs in the community. Researching and documenting stories about the local community and land to share with future generations.

4) Cultural Mentorship or Learning

Examples:

A master birch bark canoe maker mentors an emerging maker on traditional techniques for a period of time.

A community group offers family and all-ages drumming workshops.

5) Travel related expenses to attend and/or participate in community or cultural activities, events, workshops or conferences which are typically unavailable in your community.

Examples:

Attending a sweat lodge ceremony in another community.

Participating in a traditional medicines workshop in another region of the province.

The program funds:

Administrative, programming, material, equipment and technical costs or fees to implement the proposed project. Childcare costs for project staff and participants.

Projects that take up to one year to complete.

Out-of-province projects are eligible in the Travel category only.

There are three questions on the application form. You will also be asked to submit a résumé, brief biography, or organizational history and a simple budget outlining what your project expenses will be.

In this section, you may describe the work you do, where you are located, your experience and how they relate to your funding request. You may also talk about how you define your community, and how you work in that context. (500 words maximum)
- 2) What are you planning to do? Clearly describe your project. Let us know where and when the project will take place. Describe how the project will develop and be completed. (500 words maximum)
- 3) How will this project create opportunities for Indigenous participant(s) to engage in, learn and share their cultural practices and expand their traditional knowledge? What are the long-term impacts on the participant(s) and/or their community as a result of participation? (500 words maximum)
