





Motorized Snow Vehicle Operator's Course February 1, 2019



There will be a Motorized Snow Vehicle Operator's Course offered at the Laura McKenzie Learning Centre on Friday February 1st 2019. 10:00am–4:00pm. Lunch provided.

Operating a snowmobile has opened up new opportunities for family recreation during the winter months. The increased popularity of the activity emphasizes the need for the safe operation of these motorized snow vehicles.

The Motorized Snow Vehicle Operator's Course covers safe operating procedures, legal requirements, first aid and much more so that students can develop good habits and skills to be safe and courteous snowmobile operators.

Students must be at least 12 years of age in order to receive a **Motorized Snow Vehicle Operator's License**

Cost of the course is \$ 40.00 as mandated by MTO. Students can go through their Skill Enhancement or pay cash on the day of the course.

Students need to be 12 years of age on the day of the course. The course is approximately 6 hours – all in classroom.

Dwayne Hull



Once we have our community information session we will be available to assist individuals with applications and have someone come in as support for matters that maybe more sensitive.



Ice Safety—10 Ways to Avoid Ice Hazards

Use designated ice surfaces.

Many communities have designated ponds or outdoor ice surfaces – for activities such as skating – that are maintained by knowledgeable personnel. Designated ice should be regularly tested to ensure that it is thick enough and strong enough for recreational use.

Measure ice thickness in several locations.

Local conditions such as currents and water depths can affect ice thickness. White ice has air or snow within it and should be considered suspect for recreational use.

Avoid travelling on ice at night or when it is snowing.

Reduced visibility increases your chances of driving onto an open or weak ice area. This is a frequent cause of ATV- and snowmobile-related drowning.

Never go onto ice alone.

A companion may be able to rescue you or go for help if you get into difficulty. Before you leave shore, tell someone where you are going and what time you expect to return.

Stay off river ice and avoid the narrows between lakes.

River currents and moving water at the narrows where one lake flows into another can quickly change ice thickness or cause ice to be much thinner than in other locations on the river or on the lake.

Wear a thermal protection buoyant suit or a lifejacket.

If you don't have a thermal protection buoyant suit, wear a lifejacket or PFD over your snowmobile suit or layered winter clothing to increase your survival chances if you go through the ice.

Take safety equipment with you.

Pack ice picks, a rope and a small personal safety kit (i.e., a pocket knife, compass, whistle, fire starter kit and cellphone) in your pockets or backpack.

Avoid alcohol.

Alcohol impairs your judgment, coordination and reaction time and speeds up the onset of hypothermia.

• Don't drive on ice if you can avoid it. If you can't avoid it, have an escape plan.

Open your windows, unlock your doors and turn on available lights to allow for a quick escape from your vehicle. Some ice safety experts recommend that you have your seatbelt unfastened and your door slightly ajar to speed up an escape. Don't wear a lifejacket while riding inside an enclosed vehicle; the extra bulk and flotation could hamper your escape through a window.

Always supervise children playing on or near ice.
 Children playing on or near ice should always be with a companion and under adult supervision.

INFORMATION FROM THE TFN MEMBERSHIP OFFICE

In response to the Superior Court of Quebec decision in the Descheneaux case, the Government of Canada introduced BILL S-3 to correct sex-based inequities in the registration provisions of the Indian Act.


What are the Major Changes that came into effect?

The changes that came into force in December 2017 ensure that eligible grandchildren and great-grandchildren of women who lost status as a result of marrying a non-Indian man become entitled to registration in accordance with the Indian Act. It also ensures children born female and out of wedlock would be entitled to registration as well as their descendants going back to 1951.

ISSUE	IMPACT
Cousins	Addresses the differential treatment between first cousins of the same family so that the grandchildren and great-grandchildren of women who married non-Indian men before April 17, 1985 are now treated the same as descendants of Indian men.
Siblings	Addresses the differential treatment of male and female children of Indian men that were born out of wedlock from September 4, 1951 to April 16, 1985. Both the male and female children who were born out of wedlock of Indian men will now be entitled to be registered under section 6(1).
Omitted Minors	Addresses situations of Indian children born to an Indian mother and the Indian mother subsequently married a non-Indian man and both the Indian mother and the Indian children were removed from the Indian Register prior to April 17, 1985. The descendants of men and women are now treated the same.
Great-Grandchildren of a parent affected by the double-mother rule	Addresses the differential treatment of great-grandchildren, born prior to April 17, 1985 of a parent affected by the double-mother rule (created by cousins remedy).
Great-Grandchildren of a parent affected by the siblings issue	Addresses the differential treatment of great-grandchildren, born prior to April 17, 1985, of a parent affected by the siblings issue (created by the remedy to address great-grandchildren affected by the double-mother rule).
Great-Grandchildren of an Indian woman who parent- ed out of wedlock with a non-Indian man	Addresses the differential treatment of great-grandchildren, born prior to April 17, 1985 of a great-grandmother who parented out of wedlock with a non- Indian and the Indian grandparent lost status through protest (created by remedy to address the issue of great-grandchildren affected by the double-mother rule).
Unknown or unstated parentage	Ensures that the Indian Registrar will consider all relevant evidence, with reasonable inference in favour of an individual in situations where there is a parent, grand-parent or other ancestor that is unknown or unstated on a birth certificate, when determining entitlement to registration.

Secure Certificate of Indian Status (SCIS) cards:

Any members that prefer to apply for the renewal of their status card by mail because they live far away from Bear Island or cannot get to one of the Regional offices to renew their status card, we have the SCIS forms that can be sent by email or mailed to TFN members. When applying you will need 2 passport pictures and a Guarantor Declaration form. The SCIS card is good for 10 years for adults, and 5 years for children. What Are We Consulting On:

In addition to what was legislated under Bill S-3, the analysis of the co-design input saw the emergence of three general content streams that will be considered through consultation.

The removal of the 1951 cut-off from the Indian Act

Discussions will focus on the implementation of the delayed coming-intoforce provision in Bill S-3 relating to the removal of the 1951 cut-off.

2. Remaining inequities related to registration and membership under the Indian Act

These issues were articulated in Bill S-3 and enhanced by the input received during the co-design phase. This includes issues such as, but not limited to: adoption, the second generation cut-off, or enfranchisement, as well as the related issues of resources and impacts on communities.

3. Devolution of the responsibility for determining membership/citizenship to First Nations

This includes discussions and developing options to devolve the exclusive responsibility for the determination of the identity of their membership to First Nations. What is the federal versus First Nation role in determining status and band membership in regards to section 10 and section 11 of the Indian Act?





Northern Ontario Tourism Summit



The Northern Ontario Tourism Summit was developed as a partnership event between Nature and Outdoor Tourism Ontario (NOTO) and Tourism Northern Ontario (TNO) to bring together tourism



businesses, organizations and suppliers as well as all levels of government at a single event to find solutions to challenges facing the industry.

It was held in Sault Ste Marie between November 13 and November 15, 2018.

The agenda for this event included training workshops, information sessions, innovative problem solving workshops, a range of keynote speakers, as

well as numerous opportunities for networking including a trade show of product and service providers to the tourism industry.



Temagami First Nation attended as an exhibitor and represented both the First Nation and the region in general.

Temagami First Nation (TFN) is seeking a Principal/Special Education Resource Teacher/FNSSP at the Laura McKenzie Learning Centre (LMLC). The successful incumbent will start February for the 2019-2020 school year with the winter semester ending June 28, 2019

Responsibilities

At the Laura McKenzie Learning Centre (LMLC), the Principal will be expected:

- Oversee LMLC school year planning;
- Work with the Education Manager and the BIEA to develop the LMLC Annual Work Plan/Budget;
- Prepare monthly and annual reports on the activities of the LMLC to the BIEA
- Maintain ongoing communication and liaise with the BIEA, Chief and Council and the community regarding issues and trends related to the LMLC;

- FNSSP Develop and Monitor School Improvement Plan and identify areas of strength and weakness of student literacy and numeracy scores. Also, monitor outlined benchmarks with classroom teachers;
- Ensure Laura McKenzie Learning Centre special education program is running efficiently and effectively;
- Ensure extracurricular programming, eg. Fire drills, cleanliness, organization of the school, etc.;
- Research and give input/feedback for teaching Indigenous Language/Culture;
- Consultation with LMLC staff on teaching and learning strategies (i.e. long-range planning with individual teachers, individual meetings with teaching unit plans;
- Curriculum consultation and development;
- Provide supervision to all LMLC academic full-time, part-time and casual employees;
- Ensure Temagami First Nation human resources policies and procedures are followed;
- Ensure all LMLC positions are filled with trained and qualified personnel;
- Conduct annual LMLC Performance Evaluations/Appraisals
- Arrange professional development for LMLC personnel;
- Facilitate and follow BIEA policies and procedures;
- Sign off/monitor school staff attendance;

- Communicate professionally and sensitively with all people both inside and outside of the Temagami First Nation;
- Promote education and develop working partnerships with community;
- Meet regularly with the LMLC staff and ensure the LMLC staff function as a team, working in the best interests of the student;
- Attend the BIEA meetings, in an advisory and non-voting capacity and acting chairperson if requested by the Board Chairperson;
- Assist the BIEA to regularly assess the achievements and the needs of the Laura McKenzie Learning Centre;
- Act as a resource to the BIEA on LMLC matters;
- Liaise between the school and BIEA;
- Liaise with parents to problem solve and resolve conflict;
- Interact with children in a caring, firm and sensitive matter;
- Follow and develop behaviour Management strategies;
- Work towards development of the child in a holistic manner;
- Promote a positive working and school environment by excellence in leadership;

At the Laura McKenzie Learning Centre (LMLC), the Special Education Resource Teacher will be expected:

- To serve as case manager and be responsible for the initiation, development, implementation, and review of the designated students IEPs.
- To participate in all professional activity days or activities and to continue to pursue his/her personal education
- To work together with other members of the teaching staff and Principal to select current, appropriate teaching materials
- Promote the LMLC Mission Statement
- To collaborate with the regular education teacher in adapting the curriculum, providing appropriate
 modifications, ensuring the implementation of modifications, and assessing overall progress of the
 child.
- To complete and maintain all assigned student's records. (i.e., IEP, documentation, progress report, behavior plan, etc.).
- To maintain contact with the assigned student's parents or family.
- To gather data useful for planning instructional programs, modifying existing programs, and communicating with others.
- To help each student build his self-esteem while teaching the students about how to respect and work co-operatively with others

- To meet with the teachers, teacher assistant, the Indigenous Language teacher on a regular basis to make certain that the needs of the students are understood and are being met
- To work closely with others on staff to formulate an appropriate program of studies before the beginning of each school year.
