Capital Projects Bi-Weekly Update


Here is an update on the Capital Projects taking place on Bear Island and what to expect to see happening in the weeks ahead.

Community Update

DUE TO CIRCUMSTANCES BEYOND OUR CONTROL WE MUST POSTPONE THE GRAND OPENING. WE WILL BE PLANNING THE SAME FUN ONLY FOR A LATER DATE. MORE DETAILS TO FOLLOW!

The island continues with a steady buzz of heavy traffic. Dump trucks providing backfill for the Elders Housing Complex. There is also more heavy equipment on the island—with the Fibre Optic expansion, it brought over 5 barge loads of equipment.

The contractor camp is still operating at full capacity—its a home away from home for 35 workers.





Traffic on the road has decreased and parking has opened up now that many seasonal residents have left the area. Things are slowing down in the tourism sector now that summer is officially over.

There are various deliveries continuing down the road for both the MUF and Elders Housing Pro-jects. The Barge is always on the move to accommodate the 2 major construction projects and other community needs. The low water levels are making the barge landings and takeoffs more difficult with heavy loads. To maneuver more safely we now have to use the backhoe to assist with landings and take offs.







A reminder to residents and children to stay out of any fenced areas of the construction sites. There are open excavations. We want to make sure that no one gets hurt.



Bi-Weekly Update by Capital Projects Department

What's Happening at the Work Sites Elders Housing Project

The crew finalized the installation of the 240mm block walls in between units on Friday, Sept.6. The 290mm and 240mm wall were grouted as per specification and drawings. Then interior rigid insulation was placed along exterior walls on u/s of concrete slab.

The crew finished installing all the rebar for the slab on grade and installed the vapour barrier. The block wall exterior application of waterproofing was also completed an you will notice that the ground floor exterior walls are installed for Units 1, 2, 3 and part of 4. Packard Plumbing in-stalled the T's on the watermain inside the building and utility room.

A big concrete pour was completed on September 25 and 26 (almost 60m3).

With days getting shorter, it was spread over 2 days instead of trying to get it all done in one day.

Trusses were delivered the week of September 16th.

MUF Project

The MUF Project is in the home stretch. The exterior is get-ting soffit, fascia and siding completed and you're starting to see some topsoil being brought over for the finishing touches on the outside. Forms for the curbs were completed and curbs poured the week of September 16th.





Inside the building, crews keep working on finish-ing the floors and the remainder of the tile and rubber base. A finishing coat of paint will be ap-plied to the Administration Wing and the hallway leading to the gathering hall as well as the library once they're done moving millwork and materials around. Pictured to the right is the millwork dedi-cated for all of our maps and on the right will be home to the plotter and scanner.

The crew has finished the floors and base and are hanging the rest of the doors, installing the remainder of the aluminum glass frames and glass, the rest of the millwork in the Administration wing and the hallway and library. To the left is the exterior view of the library and gathering hall.

The remaining light fixtures will go up and the ceiling tiles and wood slat ceilings will get finished up. Pictured to the right is the main reception ar-ea currently being utilized as a space to review the drawings and finishing touches.







The two pictures above are the amazing views of the library space!



They will be testing and commissioning the fire suppression system, the plumbing, electrical and phone and network cabling. They will also be commissioning the geothermal system ahead of the move. The phone system and computer network will be installed and the building will get hooked up to the new fibre optic network for internet and phone service.

You will see some more landscaping taking place around the building.

We're looking forward to reaching the finish line!

Essential - The process could fail without their involvement, **Important** - Implementation may suffer without their involvement and **Minor** - Nice to have, but not critical to the process.



A Strategic Assessment exercise was completed

where we listed the community's economic strengths, areas to improve on, potential opportunities to build upon and where we should address any gaps and trends. The Asset Inventory and Stakeholder List will help us identify opportunities and challenges.

We developed Strategic Area Goals using this information to establish the priorities and values of the community. Our next step is to build an implementation workplan to move these strategic goals into action.

The workplan is set up something like this:

1) Problem Statement, 2) Goal Statement, 3) Strategy Description, 4) Project Team Members, 5) Barriers to Successful Implementation, 6) Implementation Steps, 7) Communications Strategy, 8) Estimated Time and expense of each step, 9) Resources (and Approvals) needed for each step, and 10) Performance Measures

We will be presenting our findings at this meeting and asking the community for guidance and direction.

Mining Information Session

On September 17, 2019 Lands and Resources staff hosted a bi-annual Mining Information Session at the Elders' Building where community members get to review the exploration work plans of mining companies and government and ask any questions they may have. DeBeers Canada, Coloured Aggregates, Ontario Geologic Survey and our very own contingent of knowledge holders and elders were present when we shared our Cultural 101. Both Chiefs Paul and Becker were in attendance welcoming our guests and showing them the current birch bark canoe in progress with builder Brian Burns. Our visitors appreciated the feel and touch of the building materials and the stories about gathering bark, spruce root, cedar for ribs and pitch. Chii Meegwetch Brian and Robin for taking the time to share this exciting project of culture revival. The Canoe House Project rocks!

The surveys intended are a simultaneous magnetic survey and an electromagnetic sur-The magnetic survey reveals how much magnetic mineral or iron is in the underlying rock while electromagnetthe ic survey measures how well the rock will conduct electricity.

from start to finish the process involved in testing potential kimberlite targets. Kimberlite is the name of the rock formation that carries diamonds to surface from 150-250 km below.

Coloured Aggregates - Jeff Oravecz gave us an overview on a small quarry operation 4 km north of River Valley in Dana Twp. The anorthosite rock is used as filler for industrial applications in concrete. The rock is drilled and blasted

A Message From

Chief Randall Becker

Teme-Augama Anishnabai



Quay quay, Booshoo.

I am sending this letter out to all to allow people to understand my thoughts. This does not reflect the opinions of the Teme-Augama Anishnabai Council. I am speaking as Chief only.

We have come a long way. The Federal Government and the TFN and the Teme-Augama Anishnabai have signed an MOU to look at getting back to negotiations. Ontario also stated it's willingness to restart the land claim settlement talks. With this comes a \$300,000 budget to make a work plan.

Since our election we have established an office and a staff person, we have set a Membership Criteria Committee. We brought forward a vision for economic development that would have funded programs for off reserve and on reserve members, both status and non status. Unfortunately this was shot down and deflected to the TFN nonprofit corporation.

There is no mention of the Teme-Augama Anishnabai anywhere in the by-laws of this not-for-profit company. The board also has elected members of council on the board. In the past, in other communities this has gone very bad and larger industry companies are well aware to stay away from such economic development structures.

There was also precedent set for as to how the attending of meetings by elected council is done.

- An elected official may choose not to attend an assembly or meeting at all. Without sending regrets.
- 2. An elected official can chose not to sit at the executive council table but instead chose to declare they are not a council member that day but are there as a member only.

Therefore, I as Chief will take some needed time off. After September 28th I will be choosing not to attend meetings and will not send regrets for a period of 2 months. I will choose to resume my role as Chief on November 30th.

Our membership criteria needs to be completed and a clear outline of what the TAA governs and what the TFN governs and what are shared items of governance and how will they be co-managed moving forward.

We are not in anyway ready to go to negotiations. We have no membership criteria set. We have no online voting. We have no transparent economic development corporation to allow us to benefit from an agreement. We have not set our governance committee to deal with the overlapping governance issues between TFN and TAA. We do have the terms of reference though.

In our nations offices and meeting halls there is a constant unrelenting fight to protect the rights of all our members. Power and money are stronger than sweetgrass and sage.

If we truly are the original people to this land as we say we are, we would not stand for this in our meeting halls and offices. We should be looking to the best interest of all our people. The assembly and community meetings is where many of us will lose the land claim deal. We will lose our rights and benefits in these meetings. Not in the land claim negotiations.

With respect to our assemblies it seems we get twice as many people attending when they are held on Bear Island. To spare the unnecessary cost, all the rest of the TAA assemblies should be held on the reserve.

There is not much interest from our off-reserve members to be involved in this land claim settlement and that's understandable with how the last 25 years were handled.

At the TFN community meeting the people in attendance will decide if the TAA will continue with the passing or defeating of our next year's budget.





Raising four children - three with special conditions - and running a busy and successful parenting business taught me that the only way to survive is to establish clear, consistent ground rules and structure. The methodologies I employ with the children and families I work with are no different than those I use in my personal life. Everyone follows the same routine, including my own children.

I understand, of course, that every parenting situation is different. You may be a single parent, about to become a parent, ready to adopt, or thinking about becoming a parent. As a working mother, I understand the pressures of parenting in a fast paced, high-stress world. Time seems to fly by faster than ever as we rush from place to place, trying to balance long commutes, housework, our kids' activities and ever increasing demands at work. Parents are struggling to find time to assess and control behaviors that may be out of control. Excessive behavior can cause a great amount of stress in a household if not dealt with accordingly.

A few years ago I became passionate about the yoga theory and added to my career by becoming a yoga instructor. Immediately I fell in love with the benefits of practicing yoga as I felt this could benefit many children in my practice. After completing my certification I developed a very unique yoga program which combines my back ground in behavioural development and the yoga theory together. My classes focus on helping children understand their emotions, how to regulate their emotions, mindfulness, connecting their breath to their bodies and so much more. Next to these two businesses, I also work as an ABA therapist where I help children with special needs. I believe every child is unique and learns in their own way, it's just a matter of figuring out how they learn.



From the desk of Temagami First Nation Housing Coordinator

It has come to the Housing Coordinator's attention that there are questions regarding the Seniors & Disabled Independent Living Center.

With regards to the Seniors Housing Application, you are being asked what your monthly household income is. From this amount the Housing and Non-Housing expenses are subtracted, and the remaining amount will assist in determining if one can afford the apartment. Also the scoring Priorization (which is tool used by the Housing Department) will be utilized along the Affordability Analysis.

Another concern is the rent. Rent is \$600.00 per month. This amount is for stove, fridge, laundry, hydro, water and sewer. That said, should there be any issues with the fridge for example, the fridge would be repaired or replaced at no expense to you. But only if there is no negligence or intentional damage done to the appliances.

The other matter is credit checks. As a potential tenant of the First Nation, when completing an application you are agreeing to the following to carried out by the Temagami First Nation:

- ➤ I/We authorize the Temagami First Nation to, at any time, confirm all or any of my/our income with the source of income, including credit rating/check.
- ➤ I/We authorize the Temagami First Nation Housing Department to exchange or confirm all or any of the information recorded in this application with my/our current and previous landlord and authorize any of these individuals to issue a tenant report to Temagami First Nation.

In the Policy you will have noticed that applicants are asked if they're "willing to divest." This is a term used to dispossess especially of property, authority, or title. Should you be willing to divest, the divestment must occur and the verification of the divestment must be given, within 180 days of occupying the apartment.


We'd like to introduce Calista Paul and Justin Barriault as our new Historical Grave Researchers


Sylvia Restoule
