



Dear Teme-Augama Anishnabai Citizens

Please be advised that on October 15, 2022, at the TAA Dagwaagin Assembly, 2 motions were brought forward for vote by hidden ballet. Below is the results of the two votes.

Motion #1 Resource Revenue Sharing Agreement

Be it Resolved:

Whereas Temagami First Nation and Teme-Augama Anishnabai has since time immemorial occupied n'Daki Menan.

Whereas The Temagami First Nation and Teme-Augama Anishnabai were parties to the negotiations of the Resource Revenue Sharing Agreement.

Whereas Temagami First Nation Chief and Council and Teme-Augama Anishnabai Chief and Council authorized the signing of the Resource Revenue Agreement between the province of Ontario, as represented by Minister Rickford and Temagami First Nation by Chief Shelly Moore-Frappier.

Whereas both the Temagami First Nation and the Teme-Augama Anishnabai Chiefs and Councils recognized in authorizing the signing of the Agreement there would be time to allow for community engagements and ultimate decision making on whether to accept the agreement by November 30, 2022, as the first cheque would be issued in December 2022, or allow time to opt out.

Therefore, be it resolved that Teme-Augama Anishnabai citizens, at the TAA Assembly Dated October 15, 2022 approve the Resource Revenue Sharing Agreement by secret ballot.

Motion #2 Restoule Intervenor Status

Be it Resolved:

Whereas Ontario appealed the decisions of the first two stages. In June 2022, the Supreme Court of Canada agreed to hear Ontario's appeal.

Whereas The Supreme Court's decision on the appeal could directly affect Teme-Augama Anishnabai and Temagami First Nation's rights and interests, including whether and on what basis Canada and Ontario are required to compensate TAA and TFN.

Whereas We TAA and TFN speak for ourselves at the Supreme Court and to ensure nobody else speaks for us.

Whereas As an intervenor, TAA and TFN apply to intervene, it would be on a without-prejudice basis to its position on the Robinson-Huron Treaty, including the position that TAA and TFN never surrendered title to n'Daki Menan.

Therefore, be it resolved that Teme-Augama Anishnabai citizens, at the TAA Assembly Dated October 15, 2022 approve the application to apply for intervenor status to intervene in the Restoule Stage 1 and 2 Supreme Court of Canada.

Therefore, be it resolved that \$50,000 be used from the IBA if necessary.

Enrichment Policy Changes

The Enrichment Policies have been amended and will be effective as of November 1, 2022. The applications have been updated as well. You can find the updated policies along with the new applications on our website at www. temagamifirstnation.ca. If you would like paper copies of the policies or applications, you can call me at the above number or email at tfnenrichment@temagamifirstnation.ca Please see below is brief description of the changes:

Elders and Disabled Home Repair

- For members re-applying after 5 years, the limit of the household income has increased to \$45,000.00 and \$32,000.00 for a single household income.
- Applications are to be sent to the Enrichment Clerk. ٠
- The Enrichment Clerk will review all applications with the housing department instead of • the Community Infrastructure Manager.

Arts and Culture

- Combined family applications can now apply for a maximum of \$1,500.00 for equipment.
- Deadline dates have changed to May 1st, August 1st, November 1st and February 1st, effective November 1, 2022.
- When members are pre-approved for expenses, they will have 30 days to submit receipts for reimbursement.
- Section 5 has a breakdown of what is eligible and what is not eligible. Eligible equipment above \$450.00 will be a one-time purchase.
- Information regarding Jordan's Principle was added

Child and Youth Skills Enhancement

Information about Jordan's Principle was added.

Adult Skills Enhancement

Registration fees for adults was added to this policy. This means that members 18 and over can apply to receive reimbursement for sports registration fees.

Athletic Funds

- Members who are students can apply for 1 sport.
- A coach's report will need to be filled out and attached to the application.
- More information about a Train to Train athletes has been added.

Health

- Members whose household income is below \$32,000.00 can apply for the Health Supplement.
- Travel rates have increased.
- Acupuncture and Osteopath expenses are now covered.
- To receive reimbursement for Medical Marijuana, members need to complete a Medical Marijuana Authorization Form.
- THC products will not be covered.
- Service animals must be qualified under the Accessibility for Ontarian's with Disabilities Act (AODA).

Aftercare

• Travel rates have increased.

Funeral

• The allocation has increased to \$3,500.00 for associated funeral costs.

Emergency Needs

• Hot water tanks, water lines and pumps will now be covered.

Terminal Illness

• Travel rates have increased.

Secondary School Supplement

• Information about Jordan's Principle has now been added.

Tutoring

• Allocation has increased to \$800.00 for expenses.

Computer for Students

- Allocation has increased to \$800.00 for laptops.
- A list of items that are not eligible under this policy has been added
- Information about Jordan's Principle has been added.

The 1st , 2nd, 3rd, 4th and bivalent COVID-19 dose will be offered. As well as the Flu Vaccine.





Kwe Kwe Parents/Guardians,

The following are ways in which you can help build literacy and math skills with your child(ren). The first part are ideas you can use with your child to support their learning. The second part are a list of free apps and what they entail. You can make screen time become educational and fun to learn.

- 1. Word Search. After reading a short story to your child, spell out a word (I would start with short words for the younger ones) and see if they can find it and show you. Keep points and at the end of the week or month, give them a surprise for their hard work in finding words.
- 2. Write in the sand. While on a walk, stop and write a letter in the ground (with a stick) and ask your child to read the letter and make the sound. Then ask them if they can think of a word that begins with that letter.
- **3.** Numbers. In the store, practice numbers by asking your child to repeat all the numbers in the price of an item.

- **4. Patterns.** Ask your child to count by 1's, 2's, 3's, etc. (skip counting). This builds their learning to eventually develop multiplication skills.
- 5. Have your child recall what they did at school when they get home. Recalling information and understanding work at school helps your child with building excellent memory skills.

It was a special day for our community. It was a day of recognizing our history, our people, our culture, our language and our community. Many of us came together to laugh, talk, learn, eat and reflect.

Several different events were held at the Mino Waabdaan Mawaanjihidiwining/Community Hall. The day started with a delicious Pancake Breakfast with real maple syrup, cooked by Rachel Potts, a drum song by Tyler Paul and a Thanksgiving Prayer presented by Nicole Goulin, Jeremy Pichette, Delaney Sylvester and Mariah Paul. This was followed by a presentation by Mkwaw Minising Miidjim. In the afternoon John Turner and June Twain shared language, stories and used the maps of Daki Menan to share some History. We then viewed a documentary created by the Nbiising Anishinaabek called Biidaajwaan/Force of Water. It is a documentary about honouring their language warriors. Justice Program Assistant, Nancy Shipman organized a fun poster and painting activity for the children. This was followed by a Wild Rice Dish Competition. 1st Place and \$100 went to Cathy Metcalfe, 2nd Place and \$75 went to Mike Paul and 3rd place and \$50 went

to Vicky Blake. Following this we played Anishnaabemowin Bingo. A great spaghetti dinner was cooked by Rachel Potts. To wrap up the day, Tillie Missabie Family Centre supervisor, Michelle Polson organized a Community Orange Shirt walk and a beautiful orange candle displays to light the walking path.

The highlight of our day was a presentation and a hands on demonstration by a community business, Mkwaw Minising Miidjim. They are a family business focused on getting back on to Daki Menan and working on cultural food growth and harvesting practices. They plant and harvest wild rice. They produce maple syrup. They grow indian corn, pumpkins and several other foods. They strive to involve community and to teach the children about the work they do.

The day's events were sponsored by TFN programs: Family Healing and Wellness Centre, Tillie Missabie Family Centre, Bear Island Education Authority, Justice Program and Anishnaabemowin Sagaswe'idiwin. We were also the beneficiaries of a Grant of \$1500 from the Temagami Community Foundation to support the costs of our special day. All the contributions came together nicely and resulted in a fabulous day of recognizing Truth and Reconciliation.







JUNE TWAIN, daughter to Joe Mattias of Beaverhouse First Nation and Elizabeth Potts of Bear Island and maternal granddaughter to Tom Potts and Maria Wabie as well as decendent of Chief Tonené, is the proud oldest living resident on Bear Island. She was born and raised here and grew up on the land as a girl with her family while her dad trapped in the winter or guided for tourists in the summer. She attributes her strong work ethic to those winters on the land out at Turtleshell Lake. She talked about all of the regular daily tasks that she and her siblings had to take care of at a young age in order for camp to operate. Her eldest brother Sonny, herself,

younger sister, Doreen and her younger brother George all had obligations, collecting wood to keep the wood stove going, collecting water and cleaning the laundry as well as all the other regular daily chores. Her upbringing and strong sense of family and commitment shaped her into the determined Anishnaabe Kwe she would become.

June sat with me and shared her background, some funny stories and her life's work and accomplishments. She is a highly respected Elder in the community and speaks with purpose and warmth. As she wove through her stories, I got the sense that all of her projects were successful because of her compassion and love for her family, her community. Most in the community already know what a true leader by example in kindness she is. It was a pleasure and honour to sit and learn and hopefully help her share her story.

In 1969 June trained as a Chef at George Brown College. She worked as a Chef from about 1969 to 1989, her cooking skills and breads in particular, are still talked about today. But around that time June started to struggle with arthritis and cooking became more difficult. She decided to go back to school, this time taking the Drug and Alcohol Prevention Program at Canadore College. It was there that she felt drawn into Native Spirtuality and realized that her spirit was calling out for this knowledge. You see, she spent a lot of time with her grandmother growing up who was quite a strict Catholic. Later, her husband Jim Twain, was studying to become a Deacon. She began attending the Friendship Centre in North Bay where she would participate in ceremony. She was affected greatly by her first circle and when offered the Eagle Feather one day, she began to weep. She was overcome by the feeling that the Spirit moved her and that she needed to return to Native spirituality.

After completing her 40 week program, June returned to Bear Island and took a job as the NNADAP (National Native Alcohol and Drug Abuse) Worker where she was responsible for implementing and delivering a prevention program in relation to alcohol and drug abuse as well as intervention services in the community. She keenly noted that at that time there were no programs in the community geared towards our Elders or our Youth. She promptly implemented an Elder's Luncheon program that is still successful today.

Elders would gather over coffee, tea and lunch and be able to speak Anishnaabemowin or just have a reason to get out and socialize together.

She saw a need for the Youth of the community to also have a place to go and activities to participate in and she wanted to ensure they would be interested so she felt like the youth program needed to be fun while igniting a spiritual and cultural rebirth to improve on one's sense of self worth and confidence. She knew those qualities would help the youth to stay off of a negative path and deter them from a lifestyle fueled by drugs and alcohol.

In the early '90s, June reached out to Mary Laronde who had a friend on the lake, Actor/Director, June Keevil and with the support of Linda-Joe Mattias as secretary, they began to write to June Keevil to see if she would be interested in helping to put together

a theatre group of the youth of Bear Island. June agreed to come on board as Artistic Director and so the next task was to organize the funding. June and her team began feverishly writing letters and fundraising. They were fortunate to have a lot of local support from community members and the Teme-Augama Anishnabai as well, she also reached out to the members of the Temagami Lakes Association, Judge and local Camp Manitou owner Gloria Epstein, a fundraiser for Native Entertainment as well as many others helped to financially support the project. June explained that before sending out these fundraising letters, she smudged them and prayed about them. She explained that "if you're working from the heart, the spirits will help."

There were about 25 youth between the ages of 14 and 25 involved in the creation of what came to be the Roots and Wings Theatre Group and their production of **'n'Daki Menan'**. As June explained how the project unfolded she speaks with shock in her voice and described her disbelief in accomplishing this huge project. She laughed about all of the problem-solving and ingenuity that came with creating it from scratch. She spoke with pride about all of the people who helped to bring it together. They on-boarded Musical Director, Wayne Potts. He and the youth wrote 3 original songs for the play as well as a complete soundtrack for the production. *See the lyrics on page 36.* The youth wrote the script themselves. "The messaging is still relevant today," June added. They spent their time gathering information about their own roots which led to strong messaging of the past and current struggles and successes of the Teme-Augama Anishnabai and relayed the story in a dark comedic manner that all audience members could connect to. They could see by audience reactions that people were connecting deeply to this play. In fact, the following year, they

"The audiences reaction was powerful, everyone involved could see that this was somenting special, deeper than we could comprehend." - Wayne Potts toured the production of **'n'Daki Menan'** from Bear Island to Haida Gwaii, the Queen Charlotte Islands in B.C. One of the many highlights was performing at the World Indigenous Conference. It was quite the considerable venture indeed! "'Can't' wasn't in my vocabulary," she explained.

The year that Roots and Wings toured **'n'Daki** *Menan*', they were able to get more funding from the Timiskaming Board of Education and the SEED program and the youth were able to be paid a wage and even collect school credit. Back at home they performed nightly for one-week, one of those shows included dinner and the show. Each night was SOLD OUT! The organizers and the youth had really done something special. They literally built the play from the ground up, constructing sets, making props and costumes, composing songs and writing scripts. It was an incredible achievement that has led to all kinds acquired skills through the making of this production.

The play was showcased back in the 90's and the youth are now adults, a lot of them now have youth

children of their own. Maybe it's a coincidence that all the young people who worked so hard over those summers are still active in the community and contributing in a significant way but more likely is that this special undertaking has followed them into adulthood and helped to inspire self confidence and greater purpose.

June graciously acknowledged all the support that the Roots and Wings got from the whole community. Individual contributions, contributions of Temagami First Nation staff, and of course June Keevil. June expresses her deep gratitude for June Keevil's guidance on the project. "Without June, we wouldn't have been able to do this. We wouldn't have had a play." "It may have been my idea but it wouldn't have come together without all the support we received."

Roots and Wings lives on. In recent years the program has been revived under the guidance of Christine Friday which evolved from a Theatre Group to more of a Skills Development Program that Reconnected the Youth to the Land. *Watch for the article next month featuring Christine and her efforts with the Roots and Wings.*

Q. What kind of advice can you offer? Community members, youth and mothers?


A. We need to heal the community. We need more circles for healing the children. When we sit in circle it helps you to understand others. It gives you compassion.

ROOTS & WINGS

From its very beginnings the Roots & Wings Theatre Group has been a lot more than entertainment and drama. For the community of Bear Island and the Teme-Augama Anishnabai it is a source of pride and positive reflection. For the youth involved it has ignited a spiritual and cultural rebirth. The play, "n'Daki-Menan," (meaning "Our Land") ties directly into the Teme-Augama Anishnabai's 115-year-old quest for justice.

Conceived by June Twain, of N.N.A.D.A.P. (National Native Alcohol and Drug Awareness Program) on Bear Island, the Roots and Wings program was designed to get young people involved in a project which will help give them direction in life. Bear Island is a semi-remote island community where young people leave home at an early age to attend high-school. Through their participation in the theatre group they are now gaining the confidence and feeling of self-worth they will need to meet the challenges of today's society.

THE GROUP

The Roots & Wings Theatre Group is comprised mainly of native youth from the Teme-Augama Anishnabai nation in the Lake Temagami area of northern Ontario. Artistic Director June Keevil is an accomplished actress and director whose family has been on Lake Temagami for 40 years. Keevil, Twain and the talented company of 25 youth spent a hectic seven weeks during the summer of 1991 producing the play. It was a whirlwind of activity on Bear Island as the company literally built the play from the ground up, constructing sets, making props and costumes, composing songs and writing scripts.

Throughout the summer, facilitators were invited to the community to share their knowledge with the youth on Native culture, spirituality, traditions and the issues facing Native people. The youth also attended workshops to explore character development and to acquire the skills needed to produce their play, "n'Daki-Menan." Keevil has assembled a company and put together a production that will dazzle the mind and warm the heart.

THE PLAY


"N'Daki-Menan" carries a message of cultural survival and human struggle that is not lost on audiences. "N'Daki-Menan" portrays the history of the Teme-Augama Anishnabai from creation, to "contact" with Europeans, to the present. It provides a glimpse, with narration and in storytelling fashion, of how the Anishnabai confronted assimilation.

The highlight of Roots and Wings' itinerary for 1992 is a six-day stop at the "World Indigenous Conference" in Edmonton.



Did Tever tell you the story of the first time Twent up to Maple Mountain?

A story told by June Twain in her own words

Jim and I were going to the Friendship Centre regularly and learning about ceremony, but we hadn't done our own yet. No one gave us permission to, we just did it.

So, we took eight students and four chaperones and and we paddled to High Rock and then we paddled up the rest of the way. We were gone for a week, I think it's 30 miles, I'm not sure how far. Nobody had ever gone up there before, so we didn't know what to expect. So, we paddled all the way through there and we got to the base of the mountain and we thought we could camp at the bottom of Maple Mountain but it was all swamp. So, then we had to paddle back across to the one campground on Tupper Lake. We were paddling back and suddenly this hawk came down, swoosh! Just like that. It was flapping its wings and making ripples in the water, and it did that four times! Debbie asked me, "June, what does that mean?" I said, "I don't know," but in my mind I figure the Spirits knew we were coming to pray, and the hawk was applauding! Saying Izha-dayam-yowok, Come Pray in Anishnaabemowin.

So, we camped out there and the next day we went to the top of the mountain and there were some people up there and Jim knew that we had to have a fire to offer tobacco to the fire. This is teenagers who've never done this before. So we waited 'til those people left and Jim made a fire and we told the kids, like ok, we're going to be taking tobacco in your left hand, that's the hand that's closest to your heart and then you're going to pray with that tobacco. You don't have to pray loud or anything, you're just praying to yourself and then we're all in circle and we're going to take turns and put tobacco in the fire. So that's what we did.

So, they're all taking turns and doing it and suddenly, this hawk comes in, full wing span, comes right over us, we could reach up and touch it! The kids were in awe. It came in the Eastern door and they say all life comes from the Eastern door eh. So, it came along and went around and went back. I think that was the most moving experience I ever had in my life!

They put that experience in the play! It was absolutely amazing! We never really shared what we felt after that, but they had an eye-opener.

When we came back from there John Aguonie, the teacher that we had come to the community, I told him about it and I said, "the hawk came and joined us," I said and he says, "June, that was one of your ancestors."

Isn't that amazing? That was one of the most amazing things I've ever experienced. At the top of Maple Mountain!

You know, for a long time I couldn't tell that story without crying. I just felt so humbled that the Creator would show us that. That was one of the most meaningful things I ever experienced and it came from Creator.

Thinning Projects on the Temagami, Timiskaming and Nipissing Forests

Over the course of the summer and fall, the DMLRC Forestry Crew worked on several manual thinning projects on n'Daki Menan through contracts with First Resource Management Group and the Nipissing Forest Management Inc.

During the summer, the crew were based in Elk Lake and carried out the work with brush saws on approximately 70 hectares of young jack pine plantation in Roadhouse and Willett Townships. In early September, the crew relocated to Cole Township (north of the Red Squirrel Road) to continue this type of work.




In October, the crew (Left to right: Sam Potts, Sebastien Latour, Thomas Saville and Gabe Potts-Paul) began to work on a contract on the Nipissing Forest. Using chainsaws and under the guidance of Steve Chenier (member of the Algonquin First Nation) trees that were hindering the growth of the red and white pine were cut.

On rain days, the guys have continued to produce and bag firewood for the upcoming season.

Getting the flu shot can help keep you and your community healthy!

THE FLU SHOT CAN SAVE LIVES

- Young children, people over age 65, pregnant women, and those who are in poor health are more likely to become very sick from the flu.
- > The flu shot can help protect you and your family from the flu.

THE FLU SHOT WORKS

- There are many different types of flu viruses. Every year, the flu shot protects against the expected 3 or 4 most common types of the virus.
- Everyone responds differently to the flu shot. The shot can either prevent the flu entirely or reduce the severity of the sickness.
- > It usually takes 2 to 4 weeks to build protection after you get the flu shot.
- > The flu shot does not prevent colds because they are caused by different germs.

THE FLU SHOT IS SAFE

- > You cannot get the flu virus from the flu shot.
- Most people do not have significant side effects from the flu shot.
- > Serious side effects are very rare.
- > If you have concerns or questions about the flu shot, talk to your nurse or doctor.

WHO SHOULD GET THE FLU SHOT

- Everyone 6 months of age and older.
- > If you are pregnant or have an allergy to eggs, you can still safely get the flu shot.
